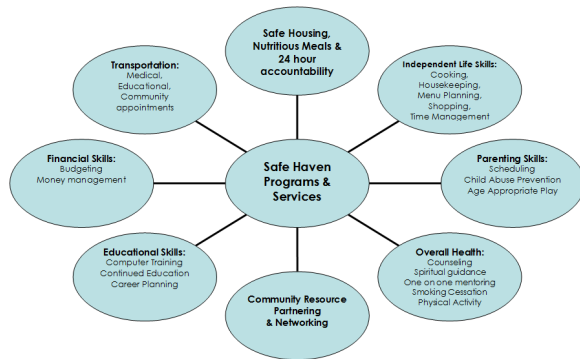


Our Program

Who We Are

Safe Haven Maternity Home opened its doors in 1992 to provide a safe, nurturing environment for pregnant young women, or women with babies, who were homeless, in unsafe or non-supportive living situations. To-day, we continue to provide the same supportive environment for young women in crisis with 24 hour staff coverage.

We are licensed to house eight women and their babies. To date, we have assisted over 450 women in need. Each resident may stay through her pregnancy, delivery and up to six months after childbirth, or longer if necessary. An individual plan is developed to assist each mother with safety and support prior to leaving Safe Haven.

Mission Statement

To provide a safe home environment that strives to meet the spiritual, emotional, physical and education needs of pregnant young women, and young women with babies who are homeless or in crisis.

The Need

Douglas County compared to the State of Oregon

Ages 0-17

Abuse victims 38% worse

Mal treatment 78% worse

Poverty 20% worse

Ages 15-19

37 out of 1,000 are pregnant

6% worse than state statistics

The National Cost of Child Abuse & Neglect is estimated at \$124 billion per year in 2012.

Children ages 0-3 are the most likely to be victims of abuse.

Reports show child abuse happens in our country every 10 seconds.

Child neglect is the most common form of abuse.

An average of 5-6 children die everyday from abuse and neglect.

Children of teen mothers are more likely to become victims of abuse, neglect or abandonment. 3 million child abuse reports are made each year.
